
## Ten Voir Dire Tips from Marion County Lawyers & Judges



- **1. Develop a theme.** Reduce the theme of your case to a single sentence and ask questions around that theme.
- **2. Be yourself.** Smile, be human, and show true emotions.
- **Observe.** Pay close attention to jurors' body language, voice inflection, and reactions to other jurors' answers. Ask someone familiar with your case to attend voir dire and take notes on jurors.
- **4. Acknowledge weak points.** Instead of hiding behind bad facts, think of a way to address them in voir dire to minimize their impact later in trial.
- **5. Be flexible.** Create an outline with specific questions for jurors, but stray from your outline to explore jurors' responses to your questions.
- **6. Be conversational.** Do not use legalese or other stiff, formal language.
- **7. Look for the leader.** Try to identify leaders and followers amongst the jury pool. Identify those in the jury pool who will not work well with others.
- **8. Ask open-ended questions.** To identify bias, get jurors to talk about themselves. Ask questions of the entire panel, followed by individual questions, depending on what you learn from the general questions.
- **9. Be prepared.** Communicate with the court at pretrial about the seating arrangement for voir dire, and create a usable seating chart that contains the jurors' names as well as key information about the juror that you intend to use in voir dire.
- **10. Listen.** Do not talk more than the jurors. Listen closely to the entirety of a juror's answer.
