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OCTOBER MEETING RECAP

The Inn welcomed 25 new members and a host of familiar faces during our October 4 meeting, hosted by William & Mary Law School. After a thorough orientation, new members joined the others for a catered reception in the new wing of the law school.



Attendees were then treated to a presentation by Kevin Walsh, a professor at the University of Richmond School of Law and member of the Board of Directors of the John Marshall Foundation.

Professor Walsh shared lessons to be learned from the life of John Marshall — the "Hidden Hero of American Self-Government" — from his time in the Revolutionary War to his role in the transformation of the federal court system. John Marshall's temperament, judgment, and "disposition to honesty and to care about people," made him not only an extremely influential lawyer, but also a tremendous nation builder.

Justice Marshall's professionalism and character, including his ability to disagree without being disagreeable, are reflected in the Principles of Professionalism set forth by the Virginia State Bar, and Professor Walsh drew helpful parallels between Marshall's life and the standards of civility to which all Virginia lawyers should aspire.

This presentation was approved by the Virginia State Bar for one hour of CLE credit.
