Work Plan: On direction from the 2011 Legislative Assembly, the Oregon Elder Abuse Work Group was charged with studying and preparing recommendations regarding the definition of elder abuse, present and future use of criminal background checks system, reviewing the process of abuse investigations and elder-abuse data-reporting system. The work group divided its work into four sub-committees, each armed with individual goals and objectives and responsible for presenting its findings and recommendations back to the at-large group.

Each of the sub-committee's recommendations were discussed and evaluated based on need, effectiveness, adaptability to legislation and program affordability.
